SWAP PROGRAMMES DOING WELL IN THE NORTH



INNOVATION AT ARGYLL COLLEGE: ONE PROGRAMME, SEVEN CENTRES AND LOTS OF SUCCESSFUL STUDENTS!

As part of a development project to bring more opportunities to adult returners living in remote areas of Scotland, SWAP worked with UHI-Argyll to develop a programme for people in the Argyll area. The result was an innovative Access to Nursing programme, deliverable to students attending through seven different local learning centres, making the most of video and online learning technology to engage and teach. Since 2019, over 70 students have enrolled and the majority have successfully completed and progressed to university. Read more here.

TAKING THE HN ROUTE TO UNIVERSITY

SWAP students also have the option of moving on to HN study after their access programme and then, from there, applying to university.
